AN INVESTMENT IN THE FUTURE OF ALL LAKELAND STUDENTS

Dear Lakeland Community,

The Lakeland Central School District is presenting a tax-neutral Capital Project to voters on **Tuesday, December 6**, **2022**. The Capital Project is directly aligned with the District's mission, as it will **provide all Lakeland students with the modern learning spaces they deserve and that will help shape their successes for many years to come.**

The Capital Project is part of a long-range plan to address capital improvements across the District. This project would span multiple years and provide the District with much-needed educational enhancements, as well as infrastructure repairs/replacements, **touching every school building**.

WHY NOW?

The District is in a very strong financial position to take on a new Capital Project. We have fully funded our Capital Reserve (\$20 million saved). Combined with New York State Education Department (NYSED) building aid, we can finance a \$57 million Capital Project that is **entirely tax-neutral for residents**.

WHAT DO OUR STUDENTS NEED?

- > Optimal learning environments which will be achieved through renovations to common areas such as Library Media Centers and new STEAM Centers. These spaces will support collaboration, project-based learning, and problem-solving, and provide access to the latest technology.
- ➤ Enhancements to our infrastructure in every school will help create optimal learning environments. Infrastructure needs include HVAC upgrades, enhancements to the fire alarm systems, roofing improvements, and more (please see inside for more information).

The District's strategic financial planning and vision have brought us to this important and exciting endeavor. The Capital Project is truly an investment in the future of all Lakeland children. We believe that now is the time to shape the future for all Lakeland students and provide them with the learning spaces they deserve.



To be eligible to vote in the school district you must be:

- >A citizen of the United States
- >18 years of age or older
- >A LCSD resident for at least 30 days
- >Currently registered to vote

NOTE: If you are currently registered to vote in the general government elections, you can vote in the school district election.

(a) That the Board of Education of the Lakeland Central School District of Shrub Oak, in the Counties of Westchester and Putnam, New York (the "District"), is hereby authorized to construct alterations and improvements to District school buildings and sites, substantially as described in a plan prepared by the District with the assistance of Tetra Tech, Architects & Engineers, and to expend therefor an amount not to exceed \$57,000,000; (b) that the amount of \$20,000,000, is hereby authorized to be expended from the District's "Buildings and Facilities Improvement and Vehicles Purchase Reserve Fund' heretofore established by the voters on May 16, 2017, to pay for a portion of said cost, and such expenditure is hereby approved; and (c) that a tax in the amount of not to exceed \$37,000,000 is hereby voted to pay the balance of said cost, such tax to be levied and collected in installments in such years and in such amounts as shall be determined by said Board of Education; and that in anticipation of said tax, bonds of the District are hereby authorized to be issued in the principal amount of not to exceed \$37,000,000 and a tax is hereby voted to pay the interest on said bonds as the same shall become due and payable.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q: Why now?

A: A capital project is the next step in the District's long-term capital improvement plan. We have assessed our educational and infrastructure needs and have fully funded our Capital Reserve (\$20 million saved). Combined with New York State Building Aid, we can finance up to a \$57 million capital project that is entirely tax-neutral for residents. All key partners (architecture firm, construction management company, energy performance teams, and district-wide instructional . STEAM coach) are in place to move forward.

By approving the Capital Project in December, voters are allowing the District to submit to the New York State Education Department (NYSED) for approval. NYSED's review can take up to six (6) months after voter approval.

Q: How will the renovations be prioritized?

A: If the Capital Project is approved by voters, the construction management firm will work closely with the architect and District stakeholders to determine the order of projects and sequencing. Many factors go into these decisions, including, but not limited to immediate needs, maximizing State Aid funding, and availability of materials and contractors. Additionally, we will work to ensure equity across the District. The most important aspect of phasing the project will be to minimize the impact that the construction process has on educating our students. Once a schedule of work is approved by the District, it will be shared with the community.

Q: Have accommodations for special needs students been considered and incorporated into the design?

A: Accommodations for special needs students are a priority to the District and design team. Being responsive to individual needs and creating spaces that support students learning in various ways is an important part of the design process. All designs will be ADA compliant and considerate of various needs and abilities.

Q: Hasn't the District been maintaining the buildings all along?

A: The District does ongoing, routine maintenance work every year. The proposed infrastructure upgrades and educational enhancements are not

'routine maintenance" but, instead, a collection of higher-cost prioritized needs that fall outside the definition of routine maintenance. The addition of the "Capital Repair Reserve Fund" will help fund other emerging needs as they arise.

Q: Will New York State provide any financial support for this project?

A: Yes. NYSED Building Aid will pay for 66.5% of eligible projects. Combined with the \$20 million saved in the Capital Reserve Fund, the District can fund up to a \$57 million project that is completely tax-neutral for residents.

Q: How does tax-neutrality work?

The District will maintain tax-neutrality for residents by efficiently utilizing available funds. In addition to the \$20 million dollars saved in our Capital Reserve Fund, we will borrow \$37 million dollars for which the District will be reimbursed through NYSED Building Aid. Funding that the District will receive through NYSED Building Aid is greater than the total debt service over the lifetime of the bond (15 years). Therefore, combined with the \$20 million saved in the Capital Reserve Fund, the project will be fullyfunded without impact on the taxpayer.

Q: How were stakeholders able to provide input?

A: The District created an Educational Enhancements Committee comprised of teachers and administrators across disciplines and schools to help shape the direction for Library Media and STEAM Centers. Students in grades 6-12 provided Library Media and STEAM Center-specific insights through a feedback form in early June 2022. Community members were able to rate priorities and needs through a feedback form available from May 24-June 12, 2022. The community was also invited to participate in two Public Forums in July and September of 2022.

Q: What is the timeline of the proposed capital project?

The vote for the Capital Project is scheduled for December 6, 2022. İf passed, we will enter into a design phase for approximately a year before construction begins. Depending on the construction schedule, we aim to complete construction by early 2026.
